Fellowship Committee Report "The Match" Lisa K. Cannada, MD

As you know, there were a record number of applicants for orthopaedic trauma fellowships. There were more applicants than positions; 92 applicants officially used the OTA website with 67 North American positions beginning in 2008. We are pleased that there is an increased interest in trauma fellowships. Thanks to the efforts of the OTA Public Relations Committee, the OTA Education Committee and the OTA membership: All should be commended for contributing to this increased interest. The members of the OTA Board of Directors and the OTA Fellowship Committee, based on the fellowship committee report, have agreed to a **mandatory match process beginning in 2010**.

The Orthopaedic Trauma Association will be using SF Match (<u>www.SFmatch.org</u>) for the process. SF Match is an established entity in the match process, having conducted matches since 1977. Currently, SF Match handles 5 specialty matches and 12 fellowship matches. There will be extensive details including the target dates and deadlines on the OTA website for the resident applicants and the fellowship program directors. The match is mandatory. The Board approved an OTA Fellowship Compliance Sub-**Committee** who are not Trauma Fellowship Program Directors and include: Robert Probe, MD, Chair, Robert Brumback, MD, Robert Winquist, MD, and Gregory Schmeling, MD. A copy of sanctions which have been approved by the Board of Directors is also soon available on the website. A meeting of all fellowship directors will be held at 7:15 AM prior to the OTA Specialty Day in Room 3009 at Moscone Center West. All fellowship directors are encouraged to attend along with anyone who wants further information about the match. Representatives from SF match will be there as well at that time.

This is a quite heated topic. We ask that all OTA members realize that the match is for the applicants to provide a fair process and avoid forced early decisions. MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT, CONTINUED

ED call coverage, treatment of extremity war injuries, the epidemic of road traffic accidents and orthopaedic trauma in the developing world, the growing need for fracture care in the aging population in the developed world, appropriate use of new technology and training of orthopaedic sub-specialists.

During the past year, we have instituted a mandatory fellowship match to respond to the needs and desires of orthopaedic residents to have a fair and efficient process to continue their training. This has not been without some controversy and anxiety, but has been accomplished in response to the overwhelming support of residents, fellows, program directors and all OTA members to bring order and fairness to the process. The Board and the Fellowship committee have spent a great deal of time and energy to bring this about – they deserve our gratitude for the work accomplished.

We have initiated a collaboration with SIGN to help train orthopaedic trauma surgeons from the developing world, and are intimately involved with the AAOS' Africa Cooperative Education Project (ACEP). That program, which has been endorsed by the WHO, among other organizations, seeks to establish a selfperpetuating orthopaedic training program in Western Africa. The first course will be in Ghana in 2008, and 8 OTA members will be on the US faculty of 24 total surgeons. This reflects the importance of trauma as the major orthopaedic problem in the developing world - road traffic accidents are believed to be the top problem in public health and productivity. Eighty percent of all surgery in Ghana is trauma related. Clearly there is a huge need for training and help, and OTA is responding to that need, even as we look after our own concerns in North America.

OTA has been and will continue to be at the forefront of supporting research, both through our own well-developed program of grant review and funding, and through our leadership role with OREF. The OTA Board established a Shands Fund endowment within the OREF. OTA members who wish to donate at the Shands level (\$20,000) can direct it to the OTA endowment, where the proceeds will be controlled by OTA for future large multi-center studies. And of course, our campaign to get 100% of OTA members to become OREF donors (at any level) continues – if you haven't made your donation yet, please do so, and indicate OTA to share in your donation.

I look forward to seeing you all in San Francisco. Thanks for all you have done to advance the purposes of the OTA. I know you have found, as I have, that it is truly gratifying to work with such a great group of people, and the personal relationships that one forms within OTA make it fun as well. I appreciate the opportunity to serve as President, and look forward to continued involvement with the Board.

The revised OTA fracture classification was published and was distributed as a supplement to the Journal of Orthopedic Trauma in November 2007. Please forward any comments you have regarding the compendium or the classification in general to me at <u>i-marsh@uiowa.edu</u>. At some future point member opinions will in part form the basis for another revision. We are currently working to have the classifica-

tion and in particular the images placed on the OTA website.

The committee and other interested members are engaged in a project to review the current classifications of open fractures. This is an area where practice has changed leading to a need to reassess how we classify the soft tissue wounds associated with fractures. A half day meeting is planned in San Francisco.

On the outcome side of our charges we are planning a project to obtain normative health status outcomes for a wide range of fracture codes. The size and scope of this project is large so we are moving slowly and are still in the planning stages.

OTA members are invited to submit ICL or Symposium topic proposals to Nancy Franzon at OTA ota@aaos.org. These topic and lecture title ideas will be accepted until February 29.

- The strategy to coordinate submission of Trauma related Instructional Course Lectures (ICLs) to the AAOS Annual meeting has proven to successfully expand the involvement of the OTA members; consequently, the OTA Education Committee will continue to centralize submission of ICL proposals. The goal of this process is to try to avoid duplication of proposals, increase OTA membership involvement at the AAOS annual meeting, and ensure a wide spectrum of offerings. For submissions to the 2009 AAOS annual meeting to be held in Las Vegas, NV, the Education Committee will follow previous procedures:
- The proposal should define the topic and anticipated lecture titles.
- The Education committee will meet to review the proposals and rank highly those that would best reflect the mission of the OTA.
- The submitting person will be considered for Moderator.
- The selected topics and the submitting member will be notified following the committee meeting in March to complete a full application by April 18 which will be reviewed by the committee prior to submission to ensure that the applications are properly submitted and the faculty fairly selected.
- The committee will review the faculty list and make suggestions if there are duplications.
- The selected Moderator will be encouraged to choose faculty from the OTA Membership, but will not be forced to do so.
- Moderators will not be members of the Education Committee, unless he/she submitted the proposal.
- This committee may also rank additional topics not proposed by OTA membership.
- Before May 1, the OTA staff office will send in the BOS application to the AAOS as OTA branded Symposia.

HVO LAUNCHES ORTHOPAEDIC PROGRAM IN CAMEROON

[Washington, DC - February 12, 2008] - HVO is pleased to announce the establishment of an orthopaedic training program in Cameroon, located on the west coast of central Africa, at Mbingo Baptist Hospital. The hospital, located in the English-speaking, Northwest Province (NWP) of the country, is managed by the Cameroon Baptist Convention. The program will improve orthopaedic care through education and training of residents participating in the general surgery program. Volunteers will also work with the local staff orthopaedist to help develop an orthopaedic officer training program.

Teaching is mostly informal - at the bedside, in the clinic and OR. HVO volunteers will participate in rounds, perform or assist with surgeries, and provide a few lectures. HVO is seeking volunteers who are board certified/ eligible in orthopaedics to fulfill **one month assignments. Retired surgeons are welcome.**
